GENERAL INFORMATION

➤ Information presented in this report

This report compiles data from gender and racial composition reports filed with the Office of the Secretary of the State in the fall of 2007 by 207 state boards, commissions, committees and councils under the provisions of Section 4-9b of the *Connecticut General Statutes* (CGS).¹ In accordance with CGS Section 4-9b, the reporting boards and commissions have at least one membership position appointed by the Governor or by a member of the General Assembly.²

➤ Major requirements of *Connecticut General Statutes* Section 4-9b

- That appointing authorities for certain state boards, commissions, committees and councils consider gender and race when making their appointments.
- That the chairpersons of those boards and commissions biennially submit reports to the Secretary of the State documenting the gender and racial composition of their membership.
- That the Secretary of the State receive and maintain the reports as public records.

➤ History of diversity data reporting with the Secretary of the State

The first gender and racial composition reports filed with the Secretary of the State under the provisions of CGS Section 4-9b were received in the fall of 1993. This statistical summary report presents the data obtained during the 2007 biennial reporting period.

➤ Functions of reporting appointive bodies

The functions performed by the boards and commissions required to file gender and racial composition reports vary greatly. For example, some direct professional and occupational licensing programs, some have quasi-judicial responsibilities, some provide advisory assistance to state agencies, and others are created to study and report on public policy issues.

² While the leadership of the General Assembly makes most *legislative* appointments, legislative committee chairs also make some. In addition, many of the reporting bodies have members appointed by state agency heads or other non-legislative and non-gubernatorial appointing authorities.

2007 GENDER AND RACIAL COMPOSITION REPORT

Connecticut General Statutes (CGS) Section 4-9b requires appointing authorities to consider gender and race when making appointments to certain state appointive bodies. Specifically, appointing authorities are to “make a good faith effort to ensure that, to the extent possible, the membership, except the ex-officio membership, of each state appointive board, commission, committee and council having members appointed by the Governor or appointed by members of the General Assembly is qualified and closely reflects the gender and racial diversity of the state.”¹

The chairpersons of state boards and commissions affected by CGS Section 4-9b must biennially file a report with the Secretary of the State documenting the gender and racial composition of the appointive body.

By law, the Secretary of the State must receive and maintain the gender and racial composition biennial reports as public records. In order to facilitate public access to the data provided by the reporting boards and commissions, the Secretary compiles and publishes the data in a statistical summary report every two years.

The statistical summary report below presents data from gender and racial composition reports submitted to the Office of the Secretary of the State in the fall of 2007 by 207 state boards, commissions, committees and councils.²

The individual appointed membership size of the 207 reporting appointive bodies ranged from one to forty-two (42), excluding vacancies and alternates, and the aggregate appointed membership numbered 2,039. There were 326 vacancies reported on the 207 appointive bodies.

In addition to appointed members, there were 372 ex-officio members (or their designees) serving on the reporting bodies.³ Because CGS Section 4-9b does not include ex-officio membership positions in its diversity provision, those positions are not included in the statistics

² In August 2007, report forms were mailed to 283 state boards, commissions, committees and councils identified by the office of the secretary of the state—through a review of state statutes and executive orders—as likely candidates for filing gender and racial composition reports. Reminder forms were mailed October 29, 2007, to those entities that had not responded. As of December 31, 2007, 240 appointive bodies filed reports or otherwise responded to the Secretary’s request for information—a response rate of 85%. Thirty-three (33) of the responding entities indicated that they were no longer in existence, were not required to file, were currently inactive and had no appointed members, or had not yet been organized. Therefore, those thirty-three (33) entities are *not* included in the data presented here. No responses were received for forty-three (43) appointive bodies. It is likely that some of these forty-three entities are no longer in existence, even though they are still listed in the *Connecticut General Statutes*.

³ The term “ex-officio” means “by virtue of office.” An ex-officio member of a reporting body is a member who serves on it by virtue of an office he/she holds, and not because he/she was specifically appointed to the body by an appointing authority, (such as the Governor or a member of the General Assembly). Ex-officio members can be either voting or nonvoting members of an appointive body. They are often able to designate a person to serve in their place, either on occasion or on a regular basis. For reporting purposes, designees of ex-officio members regularly serving in place of an ex-officio member were counted as ex-officio members.

presented below. This statistical summary report presents data for the *appointed* membership of the 207 reporting bodies—the focus of the diversity provision of CGS Section 4-9b.

A table documenting the responses of the reporting bodies is included as Appendix B.

It should be noted that the data presented in this statistical report provides a time-sensitive view of the gender and racial composition of the appointed membership of the reporting bodies, a “snapshot” of their composition at the time their reports were filed. The appointed membership of some reporting bodies may have since changed through resignations, new appointments, or the filling of vacancies.

It should also be noted that while the governor and legislative leadership are appointing authorities for many of the positions on the boards and commissions listed in this report, they are, in some cases, not the only appointing authorities. Many of the reporting bodies have members appointed by state agency commissioners or other non-legislative and non-gubernatorial appointing authorities.⁴

Notes Regarding Terminology

Race/Sex Categories

According to the provisions of CGS Section 4-9b, the figures, tables and narrative below use affirmative action “race/sex” group terminology prescribed by the regulations of the Connecticut Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities (CHRO).

The eight CHRO race/sex group categories are: white male, white female, black male, black female, Hispanic male, Hispanic female, other male and other female. Given that the term “Hispanic” does not refer to race but to ethnicity, and is intended to refer to all persons of Hispanic/Latino origin regardless of race, the eight terms should be understood to mean the following: black male (not Hispanic), black female (not Hispanic), Hispanic male (of any race), Hispanic female (of any race), white male (not Hispanic), white female, (not Hispanic), other male (not Hispanic), and other female (not Hispanic).

U.S. Census Data

The tables and figures in this statistical summary report compare data provided by the reporting state boards and commissions using CHRO race/sex group categories to population estimates for the *nearest corresponding* U.S. Census categories.

Therefore, the reporting category “white (not Hispanic)” is compared to the U.S. Census category “White alone (Not of Hispanic or Latino Origin).” The reporting category “Black (not Hispanic)” is compared to the U.S. Census category “Black or African American alone (Not of Hispanic or Latino Origin).” The reporting category “Hispanic (of any race)” is compared to the U.S. Census category, “Total (Hispanic or Latino Origin).” And the reporting category “other

(not Hispanic)” is compared to the aggregate of the following U.S. Census categories for persons not of Hispanic or Latino origin: “American Indian and Alaskan Native alone,” “Asian alone,” “Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander alone,” and persons of two or more races.

BIENNIAL CHANGE IN AGGREGATE APPOINTED MEMBERSHIP


One way to assess diversity on the 207 state boards and commissions that reported in 2007 is to compare the composition of their aggregate appointed membership to state population statistics.⁵ Aggregate data categorized by gender, race and race/sex group compared to census estimates and data for the prior biennial reporting period is presented below.

Gender

Although representation of women in the aggregate appointed membership of the reporting boards and commissions increased slightly between 2005 and 2007, (from 36.6% to 37.0%), women continued to be underrepresented on the reporting bodies in 2007, in comparison to their estimated numbers in the state’s general population.

Figure 1 below presents the data for 2007 and 2005 in comparison to U.S. Census Bureau population estimates for Connecticut for the year 2006.⁶

⁵ While comparisons to state population statistics are useful for reviewing diversity on the reporting state boards and commissions, it should be noted that CGS Section 4-9b does not require the aggregate appointed membership of the boards and commissions to exactly mirror those statistics.

⁶ Population estimates for 2006 used throughout this report are taken from “Table 3: Annual Estimates of the Population by Sex, Race and Hispanic or Latino Origin for Connecticut: April 1, 2000 to July 1, 2006 (SC-EST2006-03-09).” Source: Population Division, U.S. Census Bureau. Release Date: May 17, 2007. While the Census Bureau released new population estimates (for July 1, 2007) on December 27, 2007, those estimates are for *total* population only. The Census Bureau will not release population estimates for 2007 that include details on race, sex, and Hispanic/Latino origin until the summer of 2008.

Race/Ethnicity

There was little change in percentage representation of minority racial/ethnic groups in the aggregate appointed membership of reporting bodies between 2005 and 2007.


In 2007, as in 2005, members of minority groups were underrepresented, and whites were overrepresented, in the aggregate appointed membership of the reporting state boards and commissions, in comparison to their representation in Connecticut's general population.

Representation of African-Americans increased between 2005 and 2007, while representation of Latinos, Connecticut's largest minority group, remained essentially unchanged.

Representation of non-Hispanic whites declined in 2007. Representation of Other (not Hispanic) persons remained virtually unchanged.⁷

⁷ CGS Section 4-9b requires state boards and commissions to biennially report their gender and racial composition to the secretary of the state using “race/sex” group terminology as defined in the affirmative action regulations of Connecticut’s Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities (CHRO). The required CHRO reporting categories are: white male, white female, black male, black female, Hispanic male, Hispanic female, other male and other female. The term “Hispanic” does not refer to race but to ethnicity, and is intended to refer to all persons of Hispanic/Latino origin regardless of race. The term “other” includes persons of Asian, Native American, Native Alaskan, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander origin; and all other individuals who do not self-identify as white, black or of Hispanic origin.

Race/Ethnicity by Gender

Between 2005 and 2007, there was a slight increase in representation in the aggregate appointed membership of the reporting state boards and commissions for two of eight “race/sex” groups, a slight decline for two, and virtually no change for four.

Percentage representation of non-Hispanic black males increased the most in 2007 followed by non-Hispanic other females.

Representation of non-Hispanic black females and Hispanic men and women was essentially unchanged between 2005 and 2007.

Representation of non-Hispanic white females remained the same in 2007 as in 2005.


Representation of non-Hispanic other males decreased between 2005 and 2007.

In 2007, as in 2005, all seven of these race/sex groups continued to be underrepresented in the appointed membership of the reporting boards and commissions in comparison to their estimated representation in Connecticut’s general population.

While percentage representation of non-Hispanic white males declined in 2007, non-Hispanic white men remained significantly overrepresented in the aggregate appointed membership of the reporting state boards and commissions in comparison to their estimated numbers in Connecticut’s general population.

**BIENNIAL CHANGE IN APPOINTED MEMBERSHIP
ON INDIVIDUAL REPORTING BODIES**

Reviewing the composition of the aggregate appointed membership of the boards and commissions that reported in 2007 provides one way to assess the diversity of appointees on those bodies. Reviewing the composition of the appointed membership on *individual* reporting boards and commissions, as will be discussed below, also provides information regarding diversity and change.

Gender Composition of Individual Appointed Memberships

According to U.S. Census estimates for 2006, Connecticut’s population is approximately 48.7% male and 51.3% female.

In 2007, women comprised less than half of the appointed membership on most—67.5%—of reporting boards and commissions, a 1.8 percentage point decrease from 2005, when women comprised less than half of the appointed membership on 69.3% of reporting bodies.

Women were not represented at all in the appointed membership of 13.5% of boards and commissions reporting in 2007, a small decrease from the 2005 figure of 14.8%.

A greater percentage of boards and commissions reported at least one female appointed member in 2007 than in 2005 (86.5% versus 85.2%).

This data is summarized in Table 1 below.

Racial and Ethnic Composition of Individual Appointed Memberships

Between 2005 and 2007 there was almost no change in the percentage of reporting bodies having appointed members from a single race/ethnicity group.

As in 2005, more than half of the reporting boards and commissions in 2007 had appointed members from a single race/ethnicity group (56.5% in 2007 versus 57.1% in 2005).

16.4% of the boards and commissions that reported in 2007 had at least one appointed member from three or more race/ethnicity groups, a decrease from 18% in 2005.

As in past years, non-Hispanic whites were represented in the appointed membership of virtually all (98%) reporting boards and commissions in 2007.

Non-Hispanic blacks were represented in the appointed membership on a slightly higher percentage of the reporting bodies in 2007 in comparison to 2005, (35% compared to 34%).

There was a percentage point decrease for Hispanic/Latino members, who were represented in the appointed membership of 21% of reporting bodies in 2007 in comparison to 22% in 2005.

Race/Ethnicity/Gender Category Composition of Individual Appointed Memberships

In 2007, as in 2005, more than half of the reporting boards and commissions had appointed members from two or fewer race/sex groups.

Specifically, 60.4% of reporting bodies in 2005 had appointed members from two or fewer of the eight race/sex reporting categories; in 2007 that percentage decreased slightly to 59.4%.

The distribution of appointed members from the eight race/sex reporting categories changed little on the reporting bodies between 2005 and 2007.

Non-Hispanic black males and females, Hispanic males, and non-Hispanic Other females served on a wider range of boards and commissions in 2007 than in 2005.

Non-Hispanic white males, Hispanic females, and non-Hispanic other males served on a smaller percentage of boards and commissions in 2007 than in 2005.

There was no change in the percentage of boards and commissions having at least one non-Hispanic white female appointee in 2007.

HISTORICAL CHANGE 1999-2007

Change in Aggregate Appointed Membership

It is possible to compare the gender and racial composition of the aggregate appointed membership of reporting state boards and commissions from 1999 to 2007.⁸ This data is presented in tables 6, 7 and 8 below.⁹

One consistent trend since 1999 is the very slowly decreasing percentage of non-Hispanic white males in the aggregate appointed membership of the reporting boards and commissions, and the similarly-paced increasing percentage of female appointees. (Tables 6 and 8)

In 2007, percentage representation of non-Hispanic black men and women in the aggregate appointed membership of the reporting state boards and commissions was higher than for any prior reporting period since 1999. (Table 7)

Between 2003 and 2007, percentage representation of Hispanic men and women in the aggregate appointed membership remained essentially unchanged, and only slightly higher than percentage representation in 1999. (Table 7)

Percentage representation of non-Hispanic white females in the aggregate appointed membership of reporting state boards and commissions increased slightly between 1999 and 2007, and appears to have reached a plateau between 2005 and 2007. (Table 8)

⁸ Although gender and racial composition data for state boards and commissions has been filed with the Secretary of the State since 1993, report forms used prior to 1999 did not distinguish between appointed and ex-officio membership positions on the reporting bodies. Ex-officio membership positions are not included in the diversity provision of CGS Section 4-9b.

⁹ Statistics for 1999 through 2007 are taken from the gender and racial composition reports submitted to the Office of the Secretary of the State by state boards and commissions.

There were changes between 1999 and 2007 in the extent to which men, women and members of specific race/ethnicity groups were over- or underrepresented in the appointed membership of reporting state boards and commissions relative to their estimated representation in the state's general population.

Proportional underrepresentation of women and African American appointees on reporting state boards and commissions decreased between 1999 and 2007. Women were underrepresented in the aggregate appointed membership by 33.4% in 1999 and by 27.9% in 2007. For African Americans, proportional underrepresentation in the aggregate appointed membership decreased from 23.3% to 20.4% during the same time period.

For the state's two fastest growing population groups, persons of Hispanic origin and persons belonging to groups categorized as Other (not Hispanic), proportional underrepresentation in the aggregate appointed membership of reporting state boards and commissions increased between 1999 and 2007. Proportional underrepresentation for Hispanic/Latino appointees increased from 68.2% in 1999 to 71.4% in 2007. The increase in proportional underrepresentation in the aggregate appointed membership was greatest for Other (not Hispanic) appointees: from 50% underrepresentation in 1999 to 76.6% in 2007.

Proportional overrepresentation of non-Hispanic whites increased from 11.5% to 18% between 1999 and 2007.

Proportional overrepresentation of men decreased from 35.5% in 1999 to 29.4% in 2007.

In Appointed Membership of Reporting State Boards and Commissions, 1999 - 2007**



Change in Appointed Membership on Individual Reporting Bodies

Looking at the composition of the appointed membership on individual reporting boards and commissions between 1999 and 2007 reveals additional information regarding diversity and change.

Representation of Women

Since 1999 there has been some increase in the representation of women on individual reporting bodies. This is particularly apparent for the data from reporting periods after 2003.

Between 1999 and 2007, there was a 4.3 point decrease in the percentage of reporting bodies having no female appointed members and a corresponding 4.3 percentage point increase in reporting bodies having at least one female appointed member.

Also between 1999 and 2007, there was a 15.7 point increase in the percentage of reporting bodies with appointed memberships having at least equal representation of women and men.

Race/Ethnicity Group Diversity

In contrast to gender diversity, there has been less change in race/ethnicity group diversity in the appointed memberships of individual reporting bodies between 1999 and 2007.

In 2007, as in 1999, the appointed memberships of more than half the reporting boards and commissions were comprised entirely of non-Hispanic whites.

There was a 5.6 percentage point decrease between 2003 and 2007 in reporting bodies having only non-Hispanic white appointees, (54.6% of reporting boards and commissions in 2007 versus 60.2% in 2003). However, the 2007 percentage was only 2.4 points lower than the same figure for 1999.

This information is summarized in Table 11 below.

There has also been little change since 1999 in the distribution of appointed members from minority race/ethnicity groups on the reporting state boards and commissions, although Hispanic appointees were serving on a wider range of boards and commission in 2007 than in 1999.

For each reporting period between 1999 and 2007 almost all boards and commissions indicated having at least one non-Hispanic white appointee.

During the same period, an average of one-third of reporting boards and commissions indicated having at least one non-Hispanic black member serving in their appointed membership.

The percentage of reporting bodies having at least one Hispanic/Latino appointee gradually increased from 15% to 21% between 1999 and 2007. The majority of the increase occurred after the 2003 reporting period.¹¹

From 1999 to 2007, the percentage of reporting boards and commissions having at least one Other (not Hispanic) appointee remained essentially unchanged at 7%.

This information is summarized in Table 12 below.

¹¹ This may seem to contradict the information presented earlier, which indicated 1) little change in percentage representation of Hispanic/Latino appointees serving in the aggregate appointed membership of reporting state boards and commissions between 1999 and 2007, and 2) an increase in disparity between percentage representation of persons of Hispanic origin in the aggregate appointed membership and percentage representation of persons of Hispanic origin in the state's general population. However, the statistic discussed here pertains to Hispanic/Latino representation on *individual* reporting bodies, and indicates Hispanic/Latino appointees were serving on a wider range of state boards and commissions in 2007 than in 1999. Put differently, Hispanic/Latino appointees were concentrated on a smaller number of boards and commissions in 1999 than in 2007.

APPENDIX A

From the *Connecticut General Statutes*, Revised to January 1, 2007

Sec. 4-9b. Membership of boards, commissions, committees and councils: Qualifications, gender and racial diversity required considerations. Report. Right of action. (a) Appointing authorities, in cooperation with one another, shall make a good faith effort to ensure that, to the extent possible, the membership, except the ex-officio membership, of each state appointive board, commission, committee and council having members appointed by the Governor or appointed by members of the General Assembly is qualified and closely reflects the gender and racial diversity of the state. If there are multiple appointing authorities for a board, commission, committee or council, the appointing authorities shall inform each other of their appointees or planned appointees in order to facilitate compliance with this section.

(b) The executive officer or chairperson of each state appointive board, commission, committee and council having members appointed by the Governor or appointed by members of the General Assembly, except committees whose membership consists solely of members of the General Assembly, shall report in writing to the Secretary of the State on or after September first, but not later than October 1, 1993, and biennially thereafter, (1) the number of members of such body and (2) the composition of the body according to the term "race/sex", as defined in the regulations of the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities. Such report shall not include the names of the individual members of the board, commission, committee or council. The Secretary of the State shall receive and maintain the reports submitted pursuant to this subsection as public records.

(c) No provision of this section shall (1) prohibit an individual from completing a term as a member of a state appointive board, commission, committee or council being served on July 2, 1993, or (2) create a private right of action.
